With an Increase Stitch

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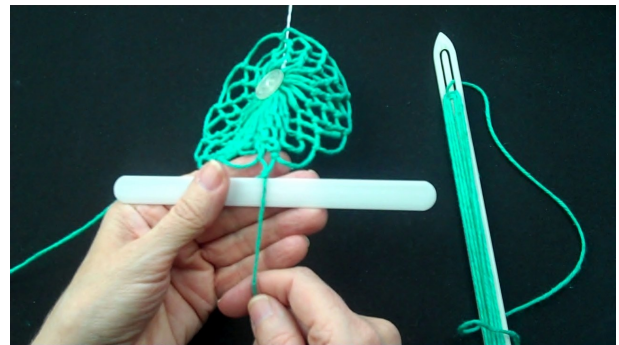

A circular netting pattern will usually not contain specific instructions about the first knot tied in a round because it is already tied at the bottom of the final loop in the previous round – the CK (otherwise known as the Collecting or Connecting Knot).

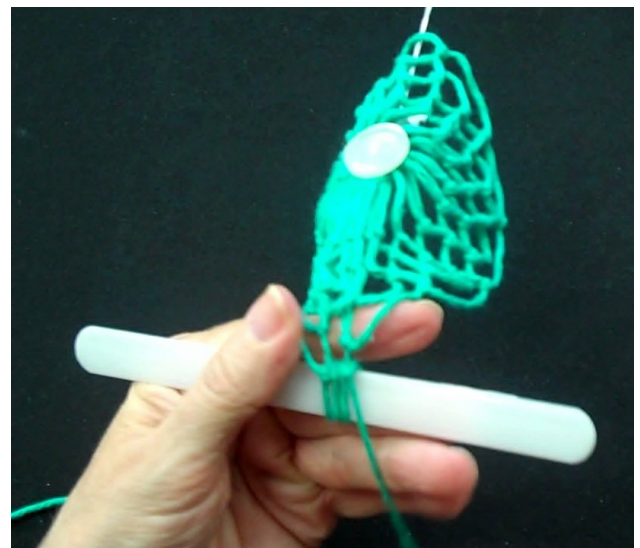
The round's instructions will explain how to proceed after that first knot.



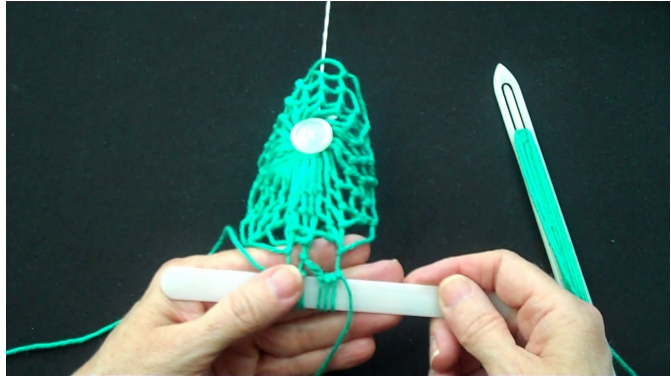
When the netting instructions begin a round by stating, “Net 3 knots in the loop formed by the CK, net 4 knots in all other loops ” -- begin by placing the CK along the top of the mesh stick.



Tie three more netting knots in the loop formed by the CK.



Continue by netting four knots in each loop around the circle of netting.



Whether one or more knots need to be tied in the loop formed by the CK, the technique demonstrated here will apply.
